


Collocations





A phrasal verb is very close to a collocation but the main difference is that a phrasal verb is made up of a verb + preposition. I made up with my best friend after our fight. **(phrasal verb)**

I made new friends when I changed jobs. (collocation)

I want to **take up** tennis this year. (phrasal verb)

I want to **take part** in tennis classes this year. **(collocation)**

Collocations - natural v unnatural





Let's start by looking at some more examples of natural collocations versus unnatural ones.

I made an appointment with the doctor
